

I understand pressure is building across all Heartland unions to see increased support from NZRFU. The growth of our Women's and Girls' rugby is very important going forward. It will continue to flourish with more support, so I hope you all get along and catch a game or two. Both these areas are growing but this growth ahead needs continued support and encouragement from New Zealand Rugby. We have seen a huge growth within New Zealand with great success across all levels of the Women's game – sevens and fifteens. It is superb to see that there are now two women on the Thames Valley Board which is simply fabulous and well deserved.

As I/you know the **Scott (Razor) Robertson** era is beginning with the All Blacks. This change will cause players at our top level to adapt and change to a different coaching regime. The World Cup All Blacks completed a very successful World Cup programme under former coach Ian Foster by making it all the way to the final. Unfortunately, they lost but surprised many especially after



playing so well. I am sure Razor will develop a team to challenge for the next World cup as well. It is sad that many of our older stars have departed for overseas' stints but that is the journey of a player at the top. It does allow other players to have a chance to stake a claim for inclusion in the team we all love so much. Watch out for these new players to emerge throughout the 2024/2005 super rugby campaigns. Of course, the NZ rugby rules that prevent any overseas players plying their trade as a professional All Black player remain, although I believe Robertson is asking



questions to modify this rule.



The Thames Valley Swamp Fox Mascot known as "Swampy" finishes <u>first.</u>

It turns out foxes are indeed the fastest on the field with the Thames Valley Rugby Union's mascot – **"Swampy"** – dominating during the infamous Mascot Race held last year.



Held during the half-time final of the Bunnings NPC (National Provincial Championship) on October 21, at the end of last season Swampy led the 100-metre charge and made it to the goal line ahead of other iconic mascots like Northland's Taniwha, Auckland's Seagull, and Wellington's Leo the Lion.

Not only did Swampy cross the finish line first – whose real identity is a secret – the Thames Valley mascot did some celebratory push ups while other racers tousled on-field.

Thames Valley Rugby Union's Community Rugby Manager Scott Day said it was a massive achievement to win the mascot race, with Swampy receiving a lot of attention throughout Aotearoa following his sprint. We all know how important Swampy is in his role as team mascot. Swampy is indeed a great asset to our teams as he is widely recognised around the Country.

100 YEARS AGO - The 1924 Season

100% success for Thames Valley: Played one, Won 1 Lost 0. Points For 21, Against 6. Thames Valley defeated Waikato at Waihi by 21 to 6. The Valley scored 5 tries and converted 3 of them. Waikato scored a try and a penalty goal. This was Thames Valley's only appearance in 1924. The game was played at Waihi on 19/7/1924.

At the age of 41 Charlie Dillimore (pictured) was a key player for Thames Valley in this game and he kicked two conversions. He had played eight games for Auckland in 1907 and his last game for Thames Valley was in 1929 aged 46 years 353 days.
