Sadly, Swamp Fox #936 Myles MacDuff passed away Sunday the 12th of May. Myles debuted in 2003 and played in during every game that campaign as a devasting number eight. This culminated in him being awarded the Air New Zealand Most Valuable NPC player of 2003. Myles contribution to rugby in the province stretched wide and far.

He represented the Whangamata and Hauraki North clubs with pride. He won the famous Coulter Cup, the supremacy of Secondary School rugby with Hauraki Plains College three times and the last one in 1994 as captain. He also won the Thames Valley Premier Championship, the McClinchy Cup, with Hauraki North in 2004 as a player and again in 2007 as a coach.

I have really enjoyed club rugby this year as it seems to be a step up from the previous couple of years. A couple of clubs are standing out to me as possible finalists. Firstly Waihi have certainly turned things around from last season and deserve strong support as they completed the first round unbeaten. It was also very sad that Sid Going had also passed away three weeks ago. He was an amazing player for the All Blacks, New Zealand Maori, and his beloved North Auckland team. The three going brothers were absolute magic to watch especially when they combined with all their special moves. Super Sid was so different with all the running options he created around rucks and from the scrum. He was immensely strong and had a forward pack in front of him that dominated the rugby world during his era. Sid Going was one of New Zealand's greatest players and one of my rugby heroes. He was a great family man and tireless community worker – see the information in the following pages.

### Sid Going Played against Thames Valley Several times.

## **Sid Going**

The last time the late Sid Going played in Thames Valley was on May 12<sup>th</sup> 1976. The photo below shows Sid with his head bandaged – the result of a collision with Kerry Moloney (Valley's fullback) as the two players contested a high up and under, kicked by Moloney, in the first minute of the game. Moloney had to retire from the game as he required stitches but Sid played on with the bandage around his head. North Auckland won 29-3. Kerry recalls that Sid had delayed concussion and was violently sick outside the venue for the after-match function. However, at a time when head injuries were not treated as seriously as they are now, a week later Sid was back playing for North Auckland against Ireland before heading off to South Africa with the All Blacks.

## A great All Black passes away - Sid Going. MBE.

## Rugby Union career.

Sidney Milton Going MBE (19 August 1943 – 17 May 2024) was a New Zealand rugby union footballer. Dubbed Super Sid by his fans, **he played 86 matches, including 29 Tests, for the All Blacks between 1967 and 1977**. He represented North Auckland domestically.

## Early life and family.



Born in Kawakawa on 19 August 1943, Going was educated at Maromaku Primary School, Northland College, and Church College of New Zealand. In 1962, at the age of 19, he was a missionary in Canada for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS Church). Going and his wife, Colleen, had five children, including sons, Jared, who represented New

Zealand in Sevens rugby, and Milton, who played Super Rugby for the Crusaders. Going was also the uncle of All Black Todd Miller. Of Māori descent, Going affiliated with the Ngāpuhi and Ngāti Hine iwi.

#### Career.

Many rate him as New Zealand's greatest running halfback, his flair and unpredictability bagging him 10 tries in test matches, and 23 in All Black games. A key member of the 1972–1973 All Blacks touring side to Great Britain and Ireland, Going's combination with flanker and captain Ian Kirkpatrick was pivotal. The side won tests against Wales, England, and Scotland before being narrowly denied an unprecedented Grand Slam by



their 10–10 draw with Ireland. He played a total of eighty-six matches for New Zealand and scored 164 points from thirty-three tries, eighteen conversions, five penalty goals and a dropped goal.

Going was a favourite with North Auckland fans during his long tenure there as halfback from 1965 to 1978, often playing alongside his brothers, Ken, and Brian, and in New Zealand Māori sides. The brothers' specialty was a blindside triple-scissors movement, which almost gave Northland a late victory in the 1971 match against the touring British Lions. That side featured the Welsh great Gareth Edwards, whose duels with Going were a feature of the tour, which produced for the Lions their first test series victory over the All Blacks. Going was awarded the **Tom French Cup for Māori player of the year a record six times;** earning the accolade consecutively from 1967 to 1972.

Going was a member of the 1976 All Blacks touring side to South Africa, his team experiencing a 3–1 series loss to the Springboks. Although only a part-time goal-kicker, Going performed this task during the test matches because of injuries to other players. His All Black career finished during the 1977 British Lions tour to New Zealand, when he was replaced after the second of four test matches.



In the 1977 New Year Honours, Going was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire, for services to rugby. He retired from first-class rugby in 1978, but continued his involvement with the game, coaching Northland secondary school teams from 1988 to 1992, and being selector—coach of the first-class side from 1993 to 1996. In 1978, Bob Howitt wrote a biography of Going entitled Super Sid – The Story of a Great All Black. At the 2020 Halberg Awards, Going was inducted into the New Zealand Sports Hall of Fame.

Sid Going died at his home in Maromaku on 17 May 2024, at the age of 80.

## Captain Cameron - COBRAS and Thames Valley. 40 games for Thames Valley

Cameron Dromgool chalked up his 40<sup>th</sup> first class match for Thames Valley in their recent game against King Country at FMG Stadium.

He made his debut against West Coast at Te Aroha on 25<sup>th</sup> August 2018 and is pictured just after being presented with his first Thames Valley jersey before the game. He can play either as a lock or as a versatile loose forward.

Over the last two weeks we have ran our Primary School Tackle Tournaments for both our boy's and girl's teams.

The tournament structure allowed all teams to play 4 games throughout the day and the top try scoring team being crowned the winner of the tournament.

How the scoring system worked is each try was worth one point, 3-5 this then went to the admin tent where all the scores were added on over the day and giving us a total amount of tries scored, them then being the winner. This also took away the 2points for a win a 0points for a loss. We have seen this as a massive positive for all the teams playing and parents watching it is much nicer seeing 3-5 opposed to 15-30.

By doing each try worth one point it keeps all the games positive and even the sidelines positive towards the referees.

Wednesday 29th May, Our Girls Tackle Tournament seen 12 teams entered which was shaping up to be another great day of rugby. Unfortunately, we had to cancel the day after the weather turned horrible and was unsafe for all players, teacher and parents to be traveling in. ## A look back at our History – Team reunion 24th August.

## 1969 and 1970 THAMES VALLEY SENIOR REPRESENTATIVES

The Union is hosting a reunion of players from these two seasons on Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> August in association with the Valley/North Otago game at Te Aroha. The 1969/70 teams were the last Valley sides to be coached by the late Norm McMillan and they are especially remembered for victories over Tonga (1969) and New South Wales (1970). These two wins enabled Thames Valley to remain undefeated in their games against overseas teams (including Australia).

Tonga was defeated 12-10 at Te Aroha (Kerry Moloney 2 dropped goals and a penalty goal, Alan Wilkinson a penalty goal) and NSW was defeated 13-12 at Thames (Ian Jenkins and Tony Slavich scored tries with Kerry Molony kicking a conversion and a penalty goal plus Brian McCollum adding a conversion).
